

Syllabus for Economics Bachelor's

Section 1: Subject Knowledge

Please Note: A Total of 40 Questions will be asked, combining the following topics, with the difficulty level commensurate to a Bachelor's Candidate.

Unit I: Microeconomics

Consumer Behaviour, Theory of Production and Costs, Game Theory, Market Structures, competitive and non-competitive equilibria and their efficiency properties, Factor Pricing, General Equilibrium, and Efficiency Criteria.

Unit II: Macroeconomics

National Income, Determination of output and employment, Consumption Function, Investment Function, Multiplier and Accelerator, IS-LM Model Approach, Demand and Supply of Money.

Unit III: Growth and Development

Theories of Economic Development, Balanced & Unbalanced growth, Big Push approach, Indicators of Economic Development, Poverty and Inequalities.

Unit IV: Statistics and Econometrics

Probability Theory, Descriptive Statistics, Sampling methods, Statistical Inferences, Hypothesis testing, and Linear Regression Models.

Unit V: International Economics

International Trade, Theories of International Trade, Tariff and Non-Tariff barriers to trade, GATT, WTO and Regional Trade Blocks, Trade Policy Issues IMF and World Bank.

Market Failure and Remedial Measures, Progressive and Non-progressive Taxation, Incidence and Effects of Taxation.

Unit VII: Banking and Finance

Central Bank and Commercial Banking, Instruments and Working of Monetary Policy, Capital Market and Regulation.

Indian Economy before 1991, Indian Economy after 1991, and the Latest News item.
